n Sunday August 24th and Saturday August 30th, approximately 250 people participated in a series of open house information sessions hosted by the Municipality of the Village of North Hatley at the North Hatley Community Centre on Capelton Road.

The purpose of these sessions was to give residents the chance to look at a series of preliminary sketches of the proposed new development, in addition to having the opportunity to communicate directly with the developer, Mr. Richard Laliberté. North Hatley's mayor, Mr.

Michael Page, and members of North Hatley's municipal council were also on hand to communicate with residents. In addition, the town manager and the building inspector, Mr. Léonard Castagner and Mr. Carl Rodrigue (respectively) were in attendance to answer questions regarding the municipality's responsibilities. Participants were also given information and feedback request sheets by the municipality and an illustrated pamphlet by the developer. Since the community centre is able to accommodate only a limited number of people and the municipality wanted to give everyone a chance to participate, smaller groups of fifteen individuals at a time, were given between 15 to 20 minutes to look at the architectural sketches and to ask questions.

Individuals were then invited to fill out a feedback sheet before leaving. The results of the feedback sheets will be

included in this month's edition of "News from Council". Any residents who did not have a chance to attend the open house and who wish to have a copy of the information sheet that was distributed by the municipality, can come by the town hall during office hours to pick up a copy. IMPORANT INFORMATION -CLOSING UP COTTAGES

If you want your water to be closed, please call (819) 842-2754. A 24-hour advance notice is required.

The work must be done by municipal employees. Should you attempt to do the work yourself or have a third party do it for you, you will be held responsible for any damages.

Do not forget that fees of \$25 per valve apply.

PROCEDURE FOR THE REPLACEMENT OF BURNT OUT STREET LIGHTS

In order to maintain proper street lighting in the village, we would ask that you report a burnt out or flickering street light to the municipality. When contacting us, please have on hand the

information posted on the Hydro-Québec pole as shown in the picture below.

A report is sent to the provider once a month in order for the repairs to be done.

RIEM - PROGRESS REPORT

The work on the drinking water intake and the hook-up to the plant is progressing very well. It is expected that the plant will be fully operational by the end of October.

Please be advised that no traffic is allowed on any of the three construction sites. This applies to all users whether they are pedestrians, cyclists or motorists. This restriction is imposed to ensure the safety of all.

CLARIFICATION - COLLECTION OF RESIDENTIAL WASTE

In addition to the basic instructions regarding residential waste collection, we draw your attention to the importance of the following steps to ensure an efficient collection service. These steps are put into place to avoid damage to the lids of your bins and the spilling of waste in the streets of the municipality.

- The minimum distance between each bin is **45 cm (18 in.)**.
- The handles and wheels of the bins should be turned toward your residence.
- Do not overfill the bin or place objects on top of the lid. The lid must be closed.
- On the morning of the collection, do not forget to remove any ropes, elastics, etc. from the lid. Otherwise, your bin will not be emptied by the waste collection company

USE OF FIREWORKS - REGULATION IN EFFECT

In order for you to be in compliance with Article 18 of By-law # 2009-535 regarding fire safety, you must get a permit to use fireworks. A written request for such a permit must be submitted to the Municipality 15 days prior to the use of fireworks. In accordance with Article 22, failure to comply with the by-law is liable to a fine; this fine varies between \$250 and \$1,000 for the first offence and between \$1,000 and \$2,000 for the second offence.

URBAN PLANNING

CONSULTATIVE COMMITTEE ON URBANISM AND HERITAGE (CCUP)

Most applications for construction permits require the recommendation of the Consultative Committee on Urbanism and Heritage (CCUP). If you are planning to build or renovate, allow sufficient time for the building and environment inspector of the municipality to look at your project (plans, sketches, etc.) and the CCUP to approve it.

To this effect, we would ask that you submit for the CCUP, at least one week prior to the next meeting date of the committee, any plan documents (placement and elevation drawings), product samples and photographs of your residence that may be required for a complete review of your project. <u>Please note</u> that the CCUP reserves the right to postpone a decision if it deems that additional information is required.



The committee meets on Wednesdays. Here are the dates of the next meetings:

TEMPORARY CAR SHELTERS

(Abri «Tempo»)

Temporary car shelters are permitted from November 1st to April 15th. They must consist of a metal frame with a canvas or polyethylene cover. They must be installed on a parking spot or access road, at a minimum distance of 1.5 metres (5'), or 3 metres (9'9") for a corner property, from the edge of the main thoroughfare. Car shelters must be dismantled completely and stored

away out of season.

BULKY WASTE PICKUP

The last Bulky waste will be picked up on : OCTOBER 16TH

Please take note that the following articles will not be picked up:

- Tires
- Hazardous waste (paint, batteries, oil, etc.)
- Cement products (slabs, etc.)
- Refrigerator containing freon
- BUILDING MATERIALS
- Items more than 4 feet (1.20 m) long
- Items weighing more than 70 lbs (32 kg)
- No materials from a truck or trailer left at the curb will be picked up

Make sure your items are on the side of the road before the date of the collection. These must not encroach onto the public roads. It is forbidden to leave bulky waste on the side of the road after these collection dates.

* Please note that only bundled branches will be picked up. Loose branches will not be picked up.





DEALING WITH RACCOONS

Be it a dead raccoon on your property or a raccoon trapped in your garbage bin, do not touch it

as it may carry rabies. Please contact the "ministère de la Faune" (Wildlife Dept.) so that it can dispose of it safely. The "Faune" can be reached at 1-877-346-6763.

LEAF COLLECTION

This year the leaves will be collected around the end of October and the beginning of November. For exact dates of collection and procedures to follow, please check notices at the following locations (post office, community bulletin board at LeBaron, Internet site),

Please follow the steps below to ensure that your leaves are picked up:

- The leaves <u>must be put in compostable</u> <u>paper bags - no biodegradable bags</u> <u>will be picked up;</u>
- No plastic bags will be picked up;
- The bags must not contain pine or fir needles nor any other type of waste;
- The bags must be put on the side of the road and not on the road.

We wish to remind you that, should you miss the collection dates, you have two other alternatives offered to you for the recycling of your dead leaves:

1. Shred small amounts of leaves with your lawn mower; these will serve as excellent fertilizer.



2. Put them in your brown bin (compostable matter).


play and adults to enjoy the views!

YOUR PETS

Respect for Municipal By-laws : A QUESTION OF CIVIC RESPONSIBILITY AND HARMONY

In order to ensure harmony between people and pets sharing the same territory, many Townships municipalities have passed a by-law in this respect. Owners and sitters of cats and dogs respecting this

by-law are not only showing civicmindedness, but are acting as responsible citizens, respectful of their neighbourhood. It is therefore important that each person responsible for a pet cares about the behaviour of their pet.

Among the many measures under the municipal by-laws of North Hatley aimed at protecting both the citizens and the animals, are the following:

Excrements:

The person in charge of an animal must remove immediately any fecal matter produced by this animal and dispose of it in a hygienic fashion, for the following reasons:



- to avoid nasty surprises to people out for a stroll;
- to increase the safety of, and the hygienic conditions of the area for, children playing outside;
- to prevent the transmission of diseases among animals;
- to encourage respect for the citizens and their environment;
- to keep public grounds clean.

Dogs running free:

It is forbidden to let a dog run free. Outside the building, dwelling or property limits, a dog must be kept on a leash and accompanied by a responsible person who can control the animal.

Noise and damages :

Is considered a nuisance having an animal that causes harm/damages to persons living in the neighbourhood, in various ways:



- by morally, physically and materially hindering their tranquility, their quality of life as well as those of their guests;
- by barking, howling, whistling, caterwauling or whose repeated cries can hinder their comfort, their peace of mind or their quality of life;
- by damaging their property, whether it is to their building, their furniture,



accessories, lawn, garden, flowers, bushes and other plants.

Stray Animals:

Any person finding a stray animal must advise or bring it to the Société protectrice des animaux (SPA) de l'Estrie.



The SPA de l'Estrie was retained by the Municipal Council of North Hatley to

see that the by-laws are upheld. To file a complaint against a citizen who does not respect any of these by-laws, you may communicate with the SPA at 819-821-4727 Option 5.







INCREASED POLICE PRESENCE IN SCHOOL ZONES FOR SEPTEMBER

The Sûreté du Québec will intensify their presence around school zones to ensure safety of the many

students who will travel by foot, bicycle or bus during the school year.

Intensive operations by patrollers will ensure that the signs and the laws are respected by road users. The patrollers will pay particular attention to the enforced speed limits and mandatory stopping when school buses are flashing their red lights.

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The police are asking motorists to be especially vigilant and to be courteous, especially when pupils are the most vulnerable : when they get on or off the bus.

In the presence of a school bus, road users need to be vigilant, watch for flashing lights and prepare to stop.

It should be noted that the penalties are severe for drivers who violate the regulations enforced in school zones. For example, a driver who exceeds or crosses a school bus when the red lights are flashing, commits an offense causing the accumulation of nine demerit points and will be fined \$200 plus the costs and contribution.

In addition, a driver traveling at 60 km/hr in an area of 30 km/hr, commits an offense causing the accumulation of two demerit points and will be fined \$105 plus the costs and contribution.

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
